In the section, Competency, the authors mention the "differences between evidence-based and evidence-informed care," though this distinction could be made clearer for readers, perhaps with examples.

Additional information has been added here on these concepts.

In the section, AI in Action, the authors note: "To achieve foundational curricular change, the critical present and future role of AI must be specifically represented in practitioner entry to practice competencies, licensure standards and regulation, and national association policy, ethics, and debate." Could the authors provide any examples, e.g., from other jurisdictions, on how AI could be represented in these regulatory processes?

Updated examples and added a call for regulators to use their accreditation power to influence this needed change.
